Revising Ekphrasis explores 19<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup>-century poetry using advanced computational methods to reshape existing knowledge about the range of possible relationships between the sister arts. Through topic modeling, classification analysis, and statistical analysis, Revising Ekphrasis challenges critical assumptions about the canon of poetry to, for, and about the visual arts, a genre that has persisted in Western literature since Homer's first depiction of Achilles' shield in the Illiad. This project considers the unique case of figurative language in computational text analysis, visualizations of topic modeling, and methodological best practices.
